The **Vision** Switzerland is a leading aviation nation.

The Mission The FOCA creates the basis for safe, efficient and sustainable civil aviation. It ensures Switzerland's access to Europe and the world. It promotes innovation and establishes regulations in dialogue with partners. The FOCA grants authorisations and conducts industry oversight in a coordinated and risk-based manner.

309 full-time equivalents distributed over around 350 employees – 65% men, 35% women. They include pilots, engineers, inspectors, lawyers, scientists, and specialists in IT, finance, HR, logistics, administration and communication.

The FOCA had an operating expenditure of **CHF 78.3** Million in 2024. Total expenditure was CHF 197.7 million (incl. subsidies to Skyguide, special aviation financing, training subsidies, contributions to international organisations and national security measures).

Transport Sectoral Plan Aviation Infrastructure (SAIP). This is the national planning and coordination instrument, in which the Confederation sets binding aims for civil aviation infrastructure.

999 tasks? No, not quite as many. The FOCA conducts audits and inspections in its oversight of civil aviation in Switzerland and Liechtenstein. It also helps to make civil aviation more socially, economically and environmentally just. The aims: Higher safety standards; an attractive, needs-oriented Swiss aviation service; an active role for Switzerland in international aviation.

The FOCA oversees 83 aerodromes,

approves their operating regulations and any construction projects. The largest of these are the two international airports in Zurich and Geneva.


Switzerland has 13 500 licensed pilots The FOCA oversees the examinations they take.


are processed by the FOCA each year. The dangers of flight operations are assessed on the basis of these and safety on the ground and in the air is constantly improved.



Over **150** countries are covered by international

air transport agreements for scheduled flights. Switzerland also has a bilateral air transport agreement with the EU. An air carrier requires traffic rights before it can operate scheduled flights to destinations abroad. These rights are governed by bilateral agreements.
